The history and activities of New Humanity Association, as you already know, were inherited by the newly created Foundation, which in 2020 operated in India and Myanmar despite the difficulties of the health crisis, alongside local populations.

In the countries where we work, we had to move **emergency funds** in order to support the population in daily needs during lockdown periods.

The activities of our projects have been adapted and have always continued in compliance with the instructions of the local authorities.

In **Myanmar**, the work of New Humanity Association in support of people with disabilities and their families continued. Similarly, there has been no lack of support for the education of children and young people from early childhood, which we believe is fundamental so that every child of today can in the future actively contribute to the life of their community. Always reshaping according to the health conditions, we continued our presence in the Nghet Awe San juvenile and the activities of the House of Dreams, to counter the spread of substance abuse. In rural areas there has still been commitment by our staff alongside farmers, and the work so that more and more people can have access to clean water.

Last, in **India** the precious collaboration with the Missionaries Sisters of the Immaculate continued thanks to the local NGO Jeevandhan, alongside the children with disabilities of the Jawahar Nagar slum in Jaipur. Children and their families are assisted with dedication by an increasingly competent staff who have taken care of them even during the moments of the most serious health emergency.

All this would not have been possible without the support of those who, despite the difficulties, believed and go on believing in our same goals: our **donors, our partners, all our supporters**. It is you, therefore, that I would like to thank heartily before letting you read this Annual Report: the support you gave us has made it possible to achieve so many results that you will discover in the next pages!

Sure of these solid relationships and the tireless commitment of our **staff** in India, Italy and Myanmar, we are ready to face every future challenge.

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# METHODOLOGY

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This annual report refers to the solar year 2020.

It was drawn up following the guidelines for Third Sector Bodies adopted by decree of the Minister of Labour and Social Policies of 4th July 2019; the Board of Directors of New Humanity International Foundation approved the final drafting.

After the approval, this annual report was published in the Annual Report section of the Foundation's website [newhum.org](http://newhum.org).

The information contained in this document is inferred from the social documents, the Constitutive Act and the Statute of New Humanity International Foundation.

As regards the Project section, all projects carried out by the partners New Humanity Myanmar (in Myanmar) and Jeevandan (in India) are illustrated.

The staff of New Humanity International Foundation has in fact supported local partners in the design of projects, fundraising and relations with donors, implementation, monitoring and reporting to donors of funds sent directly to local partners.

With regard to the economic and financial situation, reference is made to the 2020 financial statement of New Humanity International Foundation, approved by the Board of Directors and drawn up in accordance with the principle of competence.

The data of fundraising, the resources sent and the funds spent on individual projects during 2020 have been extrapolated with the use of company accounting software, in collaboration with the administrative offices of the Italian headquarters and field offices.

A summary of the funds spent by the partners on the implementation of the projects is given to complete the economic and financial situation, including both funds raised and sent by New Humanity International Foundation and funds raised directly by local partners with the support of the Foundation.

The activities carried out in 2020, the number of beneficiaries and the results achieved have been identified by local partners in Myanmar and India. They constantly monitor the activities foreseen by the ongoing projects, both in economic terms and in terms of social impact, and monthly report their activities to the central office, the Director and the President of New Humanity International Foundation, in order to verify the realization of the statutory purpose and to implement the strategic lines drawn up by the Board of Directors.

# ABOUT

## NEW HUMANITY INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION

New Humanity International Foundation was founded on December 18, 2018, and obtained the recognition of legal personality by the Prefecture of Monza and Brianza on July 3, 2019, becoming operational from that date.

The Foundation has as its founder the P.I.M.E., Pontifical Institute for Foreign Missions. The Foundation **collects the legacy of New Humanity Association**, a humanitarian, non-profit and apolitical association, founded by the P.I.M.E. in 1992 to operate with human promotion projects in South East Asia and registered in Italy in 1996 as generic association. The shareholders' meeting decided to dissolve New Humanity Association in 2020, identifying New Humanity International Foundation as the recipient of the associative heritage and asking New Humanity Foundation to take charge of the management of the projects.

New Humanity International Foundation has its legal head office in Monza, Lecco Street 73, and an operational headquarters in Milan, Monte Rosa Street 81.

It currently supports projects in Myanmar and India.

## MISSION

The Foundation pursues exclusively **objectives of cooperation between peoples** by committing itself to promoting activities of Cooperation, Development and Peace, with particular dedication to the most neglected and weak groups of local populations, through dialogue and respecting the different cultures and religions of peoples.

In particular, the Foundation carries out the following activities:

- supports, in Italy and in any other country, the study, formulation and implementation of programs of assistance and international cooperation for human, educational, professional, cultural, socio-economic development in line with the structural and emergency needs of the populations of developing countries, in collaboration with local public and/or private, lay and/or religious realities with the aim of promoting the self-sufficiency of local populations;
- promotes the implementation of specific and time-limited assistance programs for local populations in countries affected by war and natural disasters.

In order to carry out institutional activities, the Foundation can realize support activities such as: promotion of fundraising, including through the organization of events and shows; support for the active participation of citizenship in the countries in which it operates; selection, training and sending of volunteers; initiatives for development, peace and interculturality.

The Foundation has a Quality and Self-Control Code to ensure against possible risks due to conflicts of interest.



# GOVERNANCE

New Humanity International Foundation was registered on July 3, 2019 in the register of legal entities at the prefecture of Monza and Brianza, serial number 206, p. 331 of the analytical part, Vol. I.

The **founder** is the Pontifical Institute for Foreign Missions (P.I.M.E.).

The Foundation operates through the following bodies:

## VOLUNTEERS



## ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

The organizational structure of New Humanity International Foundation consists of institutional bodies and operational units, in Italy and abroad, to which specific functional responsibilities are attributed. The same person can be responsible for multiple operating units.

For the Italian office, 3 operational units are identified: Desk Officer, Communication and Promotion Unit and Administration and General Services Unit.

The structure includes a **referent Desk Officer** for each country in which New Humanity International works (through decentralised offices or through local partners).

New Humanity International Foundation has its registered office in Monza and an operational headquarters in Milan, Monte Rosa Street 81.


New Humanity International organizes awareness-raising activities in Italy to promote a culture of peace and solidarity.

## INDIA

New Humanity works in India, in the city of Jaipur, through local partner *Jeevandan Charitable Society*, a local NGO.

Navchetan project was started in 2017 by New Humanity Association, whose legacy the Foundation has collected.

The staff dedicated to the project is 12 people.



## MYANMAR

New Humanity Myanmar was registered in Myanmar in 2002, is registered with the Burmese Home Ministry as an International NGO and works through a Memorandum of Understanding with the Ministry of Social Affairs.

In October 2020, the Board of Directors of New Humanity International Foundation decided to acquire New Humanity Myanmar as a secondary branch: the process will be completed during 2021.

New Humanity Myanmar has 3 offices in Myanmar, in the cities of Yangon, Taunggyi and Kyaing Tong. In 2020 it counted a staff of 26 people (6 expatriates and 20 locals).

# COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION

This project aims at the rehabilitation and social inclusion of children with disabilities in rural areas. It started in 2005 in Taunggyi and since 2014 we have also been operating in Kyaing Tong area, where we have started a dialogue with local authorities to build a rehabilitation center during 2021.

Following the methodology of Community-Based Rehabilitation (RBC) indicated by the WHO, we try to promote the social inclusion of children not only through physical rehabilitation, but also through the work with the community and family thanks to regular home visits. Our staff supports families of children with disabilities with assistive services, but the methodology we have adopted also considers their autonomy fundamental; for this reason we have started several activities to support them and make them autonomous also economically, such as agricultural training, micro-entrepreneurship, specific courses for young women in make-up and tailoring to improve their skills.

# Chit Naing Story



Chit Naing is a 3 year old boy with down syndrome, he has a developmental delay in cognitive skills and lives in Kon Lon village tract, in Taunggyi district.

Our physiotherapist, Ju Ju, visited his family for the first time in September 2019 and since then he has improved so much! Thanks to home based treatments included in our Community Based Rehabilitation program, we're helping him to develop his full potential.

Here is his story.

"I met Chit Naing in September 2019 and I made a first physiotherapeutic evaluation. When we met for the first time, the child was able to roll in a supine position, he was able to sit very well but he was not crawling, he simply moved moving on the buttocks and tried to stand with the help of an adult. The child often got sick due to his low immune system. For these reasons, it was important to explain to the mother the conditions of Down syndrome and the importance of nutrition, hygiene and early childhood intervention for a child with such disabilities.

I then did a physiotherapy treatment such as standing up and sitting down several times to improve the power and tone of the muscles of the lower limbs. I taught him to screw and unscrew the bottle lip to help him improve fine motor skills. I provided wooden forms and teaching materials to play to improve his cognitive, communicative and social skills.

We also provided child walker with wheel to allow him to practice standing and walking.

After only 5 months, Chit Naing manages to crawl forward and manages to stand up without the help of an adult. He is able to walk with the walker with the help of his mother in their home. The muscle power of the lower limbs has improved considerably. It is able to screw and unscrew the cap of the water bottle very well. He is learning to stack toy containers and insert the 4 different wooden shapes.

It was important to have explained and taught all these exercises and activities to her mother, so that she was able to participate in the activities and stimulate her baby. This is exactly the added value of Community Based Rehabilitation, to involve parents and relatives in children's rehabilitation in order to develop their maximum potential. The development of Chit Naing has already improved a lot and there will be further improvements!"



# NAVCHETAN

This project aims at the rehabilitation and social inclusion of children with disabilities in the Jawahar Nagar slum in Jaipur, through the methodology of Community-based Rehabilitation. Physiotherapy and special education sessions, carried out both in a center and at home, allow the improvement of children's physical condition, while promoting their integration into the community.



# Naman Story



Naman is a 11 year old boy, first among the three children of Mr.Radheshyam and Mrs.Bimala. He was born on 27.05.2009 at Jawaharnagar slum Jaipur, Rajasthan and they named him Naman meaning 'Greetings'. Being the first pregnancy, the mother was given good care and all check ups were done on time and she had a full term pregnancy and a normal delivery at Government hospital Jaipur. But as he was born he had very low pulse rate and so he was kept in incubator for 7 days and only on 8<sup>th</sup> day he was given to his mother for feeding. The child would not drink sufficiently and was feeling breathless while sucking the breast. So the mother feeding the breast milk with spoon. By the time he was 6 months baby he was not crossing the milestones and so he was taken to hospital and at 18 months CT scan was done for him. The doctor diagnosed him to have Cerebral Palsy (CP) with 40% mental retardation. They followed the instructions of the doctor for 6 months and then left everything and went after superstitions and some religious rituals for his healing. But seeing no improvement they gave up everything.

The mother slowly tried to enquire about the history of his father's family and came to know that two of his father's uncles were having such problems. She also observed that Naman's first cousin Sachin has the same problem. The girl children instead don't show this, so it seems to be a genetically transmitted disability especially to the boys who are born within the family.

Naman was 8 year old, when we found him during the survey in the year 2018. We suggested the parents to bring him to the centre for physiotherapy, but they were not willing because he was now growing tall, the mother could not carry him and he could not walk without someone holding his hands. After many visits to the family, they began to bring him to the centre. When he came he was a fully other dependent child, unable to balance himself on feet. He had totally uncoordinated movements of hands and legs. He used to fall frequently and was not able to walk without support.

The physiotherapy treatment and of fine motor and gross motor activities at the centre brought in him drastic improvement and confidence to the possibility of walking without support; he is now able to manage his life and also has improved in his communication skill and good manners. Indeed, he is now able to drink water from a cup, eat food with spoon, write alphabets and numbers, climb and get down the staircase with the support of the rail. He does activities of daily life like having bath, combing the hair, brush teeth etc. He wears his sandals and removes it and keep on the rack. He learned to kick the ball, wash the dish, clean the room with a broom etc.

We helped him with some bureaucratic matters, too. He's got his Aadhaar card, the disability certificate and his name was included as disabled in the family card. Last, we applied for disability pension, and from 2019 he is receiving Rs.750 per month as disability pension from the government.

He has two younger sisters who love him and care for him. He also loves his parents and siblings. Now we are preparing him to join in a nearby government school who permits him to attend physiotherapy and special education at Navchetan as well.

# SUPPORT TO CENTERS FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITY

This project, launched in 2002, aims at the rehabilitation of people with disabilities host in the centers of the cities in which we operate. We support these realities by providing primary goods monthly, but also by improving the quality of services through the inclusion of qualified staff in the centers and the training of all their staff by professionals, such as physiotherapists, a nurse and a psychomotricist.





# EDUCATION FOR ALL



This project, launched in 2005, aims to promote the full physical and psychological development of kids in early childhood in Myanmar, improving the quality of educational services for children between 2 and 5 years old provided by local organisations. We organize training and awareness-raising on the themes of children and education for teachers, parents, village leaders and operators and we support the organization and training of Management Committees of kindergartens. We also offer agricultural training to parents of the children involved, in order to improve the living conditions of families.

# HOUSE OF DREAMS

The project started in 2017 with the aim of facing the problem of drug and other substances abuse in Shan State. It is made up of **3 components**:

## 1 EDUCATION

The lack of rehabilitation paths is due to a lack of culture and professional figures in this field. Through the translation into Burmese language of psychology manuals, the organization of trainings for students and operators, it aims to train professionals able to accompany people with addiction problems on a rehabilitation path.

House of Dreams is the name of the house where people with drug addiction problems who want to start a real path of rehabilitation are welcomed, through the constant accompaniment of the psychologist in a familiar environment.

# NGHET AWE SAN

The project started in 2016 with the aim of improving the quality of life of boys in the Nghet Awe San juvenile and promoting their future social reintegration. For this reason, a primary school has been set up within the juvenile and vocational trainings are organized for boys who are close to the end of their sentence. Last, we promote the strengthening of the professional skills of operators and provide psychological support both to young prisoners and to operators living in prison.

# Leo's story



Leo Hawng Lwan is our teachers supervisor in Nghet Aw San Youth training school, since November 2019.

He believes in teaching in that school. He thinks that juvenile centers also deserve quality education. His vision is to help these boys to find out their potentials and to be able to contribute to the society after their meaningful stay in school. He says: "Our future is in their hands, so without giving them the quality education, care, understanding and acceptance how could we expect our brighter future from them?".

Leo has four siblings and he is the second son. His father passed away when he was young.

He started his job as a teacher in our project and since November 2019 he is teachers' supervisor. He faced some challenges such as learning the culture and procedures of the school and approaching in the right

way school's staff to help them in what they need.

Now he could learn and adapt all these challenges with the help of his faithful and collaborative team members. He says: "My colleagues shared the culture and procedures of the school as much as they could and the most important things here is to be flexible with all the situations and changes".





# WASH

The project, launched since 2008, aims to ensure a continuous and constant water supply in rural areas to improve the living and health conditions of the communities in which we operate. For this reason we build water infrastructure systems and provide awareness-raising and hygienic training meetings in communities. We also organize and form water system management committees, which deal with maintaining and managing the water system over time, thus ensuring its sustainability.

# *U Ah Jone's story*

My name is U Ah Jone. I live in Khun Sai (Upper) Village under Loi Mwe Village Tract, in Kyaing Tong township. In my family we are eight: me, my wife and our 6 children.

I am of Li Shaw ethnicity. We grow three acres of paddy field. The paddy fields are located six miles below the hill of Loi Mwe. We also have some livestock such as buffalos, cattle and pigs.

When I lived at my parents' home in their village, I had access to water from the lower part of the village where the water source used to be. Gradually, the weather got worse and the water gradually disappeared.



Since I got married, when I was about 30 years old, we have been carrying water and rainwater from the bottom of the house in the rainy season. In dry seasons, winter and summer, we used to take a bike or motorcycle or a bullock cart to Loi Mwe Lake to get the water, which is about 0.5 Miles far from the village. We had to carry water every day for our household water and animals.

Then New Humanity Myanmar arrived and started a project for a solar water supply system.

This was really a life change!

When the water supply system was provided in 2014, New Humanity Myanmar built three water reservoirs (with concrete rings) for Khun Sai (Upper) village. I have one reservoir close to my house and it can fill with water in the morning, and during the night. The house and the water storage tank is about 20 feet away, so we are able to get access to the water whenever we need for the household use without wasting a lot of time.


Since 2017 there has been the connection from the small water tank with 0.5 inch plumbing to the house: a unit of water for water use costs only 1,000 to 1,500 kyat per month.

We are so happy now that the water is already in the house and we can work more without worrying or wasting time to go to take water every day.

We are so grateful to New Humanity for having improved our lives!

# SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE AND REFORESTATION

The project, launched in 2006, aims to promote sustainable and environmentally friendly agricultural development in rural areas of Shan State. In addition, it aims to reduce the impact of the increasing deforestation and soil erosion of recent years, due to the implementation of environmental friendly agricultural techniques and climate change. On this purpose, agricultural trainings are organized using the Farmer Field School method on agricultural techniques, the mechanization of agriculture, and for the promotion of crops such as tea and coffee, respectful of the local environment. Nurseries for the distribution of plants for reforestation are also managed and the establishment of "Forest Preservation" groups in villages is promoted.



# *U Angelo's story*

"My name is U Angelo and I live in the village of Naung Leng in Keng Tung district. I am 50 years old, of Kha ethnicity and Christian. I live with my family, my wife, three children, two boys and a girl, my mother and aunt. In my village there are 30 families for a total of 200 inhabitants.

We possess two acres of rice paddy that produce 100 baskets of rice (2,100 kg), but this is not enough to eat the whole year. We also have 5 buffaloes, 5 pigs and 20 chickens that we partly sell to meet our needs. We grow corn and tea plants. I also own another 8 acres of land mostly with bamboo and shrubs.

We learned that New Humanity was working on rural development in the village of Loi Mwe which is about seven miles from ours, but it was difficult to reach.

New Humanity Myanmar then invited me to collaborate on the planting and agriculture program in my village. So in 2014 we started the construction of a nursery with a small reservoir for water supply. Thanks to this, as of 2015 we had the first local varieties of green tea, wild apple trees, coffee, macadamia and vegetables. Local tea varieties have been gradually expanded over the years; as of 2018, as many as 6 acres of tea were grown! Within this plantation, during the rotation year we grow cabbage. Here, in addition to my family, other farmers work, too. Today thanks to these changes we produce a greater amount of tea and vegetables and our income has increased!



Although I am not a rich man I am happy with the money I earn because they allow me to invest in the farm, buy the necessary equipment and expand the crops. Almost 300,000 tea plantations from my farm have been grown in partnership with New Humanity Myanmar and I'm happy to see the excitement in farmers growing their own tea! Like me, the inhabitants of the surrounding villages are very happy to make money from their productions.

We are really grateful for this possibility of collaboration for the cultivation of tea, coffee, avocados and other crops, and for being able to learn modern and advanced agricultural techniques: we have also received support to build a plastic roof for drying tea leaves, to make fences, toilets and a water tank in the factors to... And it was a great opportunity to develop new friendships and exchange techniques among us in the field of agriculture!"

The project, launched in 2014 and concluded in 2020, organised training courses and targeted supervisions on savings management to enable villages to develop micro-entrepreneurship activities. The purpose of this training has always been to equip local communities with the necessary tools to activate Rural Savings Banks (credit unions). After an analysis of needs and the identification of partners in the territory, the project created informal savings groups and their registration as credit unions, with the task of managing savings and providing credits to members. This develops the local community economy and encourages forms of local development.

In May 2020 we concluded the project, leaving the Credit Union and their management in the hands of the local Dioceses.

The financial statement was drawn up in abbreviated form since the limits laid down in Art. 2435 -bis of the Civil Code were not exceeded.
